IT'S SEPTEMBER. DO YOU KNOW WHERE YOUR CQWW SCORE IS ?

I surmised that it could be the satisfaction of running over 200 per hour, or the artful, scholarly feeling of flying no-mistakes straight through a Sprint or SS QSO at 45 WPM. Or I might like the feeling of power after winning 14.160 after a long battle with a guy who has run EU for the last 6 hours while we grovel in their QRM. All of this is close to the real reason why I like contesting.

My personal issue of the September CQ showed up, and contained within were the complete results of the 86 WW SSB! Excitedly and without abandon I zoom in to the opening on page 11. Good--it's for real. Now I have to check as fast as possible to make sure that my call is there with that score.

God, where is it? Flip through all the advertisements that stretch every contest report immeasurably, and finally there are the East coast scores which are always on their own page. They should go at the back of the report because they win all the contests anyway. Aha! Here we are on page 22. My pulse skyrockets as there's something wrong. My call isn't here!! " Oh no, what now? I mean I know I didn't try all that hard, but I did put in some really miserable hours for this test" Think, think, maybe they put my score in with the other scores from the Pacific. Yeah that must be what happened. Everybody has been confused with Aha-To-You since I've been home. Flip through some more ads, there is Guam, but only a magnificent score by KG6DX (even in a state of panic a good contester can be awed!). I'm not there either.
